Here at TCCE, we designed a program called "The Blockademics" that allows community partners to connect with students in school and after school. Through this program, members of the Albany518SNUG outreach team hold team-building circles during class, assist with TCCE community events and activities, and show our scholars how the academic and personal life connects. We currently have 10% of our scholars who are participants of the Albany518SNUG Program. We will continue assure they are on track to graduate.

The password to log in to our school's survey is **Tony2022**

Please note this password is case sensitive. The survey will be **open through March 1**.

It's easy to complete online – just follow one of the two links and enter the password. There are 25 questions that are rated on a five-part scale. There also are three open

questions for you to offer your comments.

All survey responses are anonymous. We ask that there be one survey per household (if you have students in more than one school, then one survey per household for each of your children's schools; you will



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receive a similar letter from those schools with the password to login to that survey).

Winter attendance update

We're getting better, but we have a long way to go. Our attendance goal for the 2021-2022 academic year is to decrease the number of scholars who are considered chronically absent from 81.6% to 71.6%.

Chronic absenteeism is defined as missing more than 10% or 18 days in a school year. During the second quarter, TCCE scholars demonstrated a commitment to attending school on a regular basis. Attending school daily is critical to the success of each scholar and ensuring they have the skills and knowledge to graduate and reach their full potential.

Students get many benefits from attending school. They grow academically, socially and emotionally. Being in school also allows students to build important supportive relationships with their peers, teachers and staff members.

Here are some ways you can help your student get to school:

- Make sure your student keeps a regular bedtime and establishes a morning routine.
- Turn off all electronics including TVs, phones and tablets at bedtime.
- Check with our school nurse or office staff if you are not sure about when to keep your child at home due to illness.
- Avoid scheduling vacations or medical appointments during school hours.
- Ask teachers and counselors for advice if your student feels anxious about going to school.
- Develop backup plans for getting your student to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, neighbor or another parent to take your student to school.

Please let us know how we can best support you so your student can get to school each day, on time.



Student ID reminder

For the safety of all, student IDs must be visible and readily available at all times. In addition, all students must present an ID to any staff member upon request.

It's important for us to know and be able to account for all the students in our building.

If your student loses their ID, please ask them to report it to Ms. Conti so we can get a replacement ID, which costs \$5.

Mobile health van at TCCE

Whitney on Wheels – the mobile health van operated by Whitney Young Health – is at TCCE every other Wednesday to provide physicals and other health services to any student or family member.

Services the WOW van provides include:

- Annual and sports physicals
- Sick visits
- Vaccinations
- Health and nutrition education
- Referrals to specialists
- Asthma checks



This van is open to all students, family members, community members and others who want to use it. Please note that you need to either be, or become, a Whitney Young patient to receive services from the van.
