
The NSES Pledge

HIGHLIGHTS FROM EACH GRADE

Prekindergarten. This week we will conclude our Celebrations Around the World Unit. Pre-K loved learning about traditions and what they look like in different countries. When we come back from break, we will be diving into a space unit! It's always a blast learning about our solar system!

Kindergarten. We are working on counting and writing numbers 0-10 in math. We are also working on expressing our feelings by using the mood meter during our social-emotional learning time. In English language arts, we are working on identifying letters, sounds and sight words. We are talking about seasons, pumpkins, apples and the five senses.

First grade. We are learning to add and subtract within 20 while explaining how we got our answers. We are working hard to master sight words, and we have practiced short a,i and o. Students are recognizing and producing rhymes and learning to retell main ideas and key details. We also learned all about pumpkins and bats.

Second grade. We are thrilled to be partnering with Five Rivers Environmental Education Center this year, with one visit a month. This month, we learned all about animals and their habitats. In math, we are working on addition and subtraction within 20. Students are learning to read stories and identify the main idea.

Third grade. We are very excited to be learning about multiplication in math class. Students have been learning about what an "array" is. This will lead directly into division. In English language arts, we have been learning how to go back into a passage to look for text evidence while answering questions and being able to "prove" our answer.

Fourth grade. We are well into our text-based questions and answers through reading various texts and articles. We have been learning a lot about volcanoes in English language arts and science. Please ask your child to share their newfound knowledge with you! In math, we just finished learning and practicing strategies when adding and subtracting multi-digit whole numbers. This week, we are moving into multi-digit multiplication using many different strategies! To prepare for larger multiplication problems, students should be practicing multiplication facts at home.

Fifth grade. In math, we have been working our way through place value to the thousandths place. We are also adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing with decimals and whole numbers. In ELA, students are working on answering text-dependent questions using the text to support answers to questions in both short responses and essay writing. We will also be creating our own narrative writing piece in the next couple of weeks. In science, we have been learning about food chains and food webs, and we will be creating our own compost bins with red worms. In social studies, students have been learning about current events and working on writing pieces in response to some news stories.

Art. Kindergarten is exploring materials using books as inspiration. First grade is thinking about family traditions and creating holiday meal collages. Second grade is designing inventive houses and making them in clay. Third grade is making photo collages of how and where they most like to express themselves. Fourth grade is exploring using line, shape, and pattern to create visual texture. Fifth grade is using art to express issues that are important to them and making protest art prints.

General music. All grades started off the year playing musical games that enforce steady beat and using their singing voice. Kindergarten through second grade students have been learning and reviewing musical concepts such as high/low, loud/soft, and long (ta)/short (titi). Third through fifth graders have been composing rhythmic patterns. All grades played percussion instruments in October, preparing to use different classroom instruments as the year progresses.

Band/orchestra. Fourth and fifth grade players worked hard to prepare for their Dec. 21 concert on the stage at Hackett Middle School. The beginner program is ending, and new students will begin selecting instruments soon.





















TRAFFIC SAFETY = YOUR CHILD'S SAFETY

This year we have worked really hard to address the traffic concerns with our morning drop-off, and it saddens me to have to write about adults ignoring safety concerns in a newsletter that is supposed to be celebrating our students and our school. However, it seems we still have quite a few families not helping to keep all of our students safe, choosing to blatantly ignore us and our drop off procedures.

In addition to this, I have witnessed parents arguing with each other in front of their child and others, and I have physically placed myself in front of three different cars to prevent a child from being hit.

Respectfully, please follow our drop off procedures:

- Please pull as far up as you can to drop off your child. Please do not stop directly in front of the school. There are many times I am waving to parents to move up further and they still stop in front of the school. This causes a huge backup not only in our drop-off lane, but down New Scotland Avenue.
- Please do not sit in your car and watch your child walk into school.
- Please make sure your child is ready to exit the car. Do not spend time in the lane getting coats and other materials ready.
- Please do not stand outside your car and give your child a long goodbye or fix their appearance.
- If you are a walker, please use the crosswalk. Stop walking through the drop-off lane. It is roped off for a reason.
- If you want more time with your child in the morning, need more time getting their materials ready, want to see them actually walk into school or have any other reason to prevent you from dropping off and leaving, please park your car on the side street and walk your child in.

The last thing any staff person wants to do is argue with a parent, especially at the start of the day. We try to greet everyone with a smile and even assist students out of the cars. We want everyone to start their day off right. Please help us keep students safe by following our procedures.
